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

Important ways you can give of your time:

- 1) Read to your child, or have him/her read to you
- 2) Ask them about their day, tell them about yours. I find it amazing that when I ask my son about his day, he is excited to tell me, but even more excited to turn it around and ask me, "Dad, how was your day? Tell me about it!"
- 3) Have genuine conversations with your children about daily events: the weather, the election, even about trips or other events that might be in the works. This allows your children to use expressive language and critical thinking.
- 4) Involve your children in decision making and problem solving. A child who has everything handed to him/her is not as rich as those who help construct meaning and find answers.
- 5) Incorporate math, reading, and other skills into everyday life. For example, the family is making dinner, you can incorporate many skills into the process (measurement of ingredients, reading the recipe, and calculating time of cooking). Or, if you go shopping, have your children help you develop the list and add up cost of the items. There are many ways to incorporate learning into things that you do every day.
- 6) Love your children and spend quality time with them. Take them to the library, go to the park or for a walk, play sports together, and show them how much you care.

Children have an inherent love of learning and it is our job to foster and encourage that and help them grow. Constantly praise your child and teach him/her to do him/her best. Discuss with your children our NED Principles (Never give up (focus/persistence), Encourage others (kindness/shared learning), Do your best (diligence/excellence). Involvement every step of the way is critical to the growth process. We welcome parents to come to school and volunteer in classrooms or at school events to show your support and be a part of the plan. Feel free to contact your child's teacher or the office for ways to help. I look forward to working with you so we can all achieve success!

PARENT NOTIFICATION OF TEACHER QUALIFICATIONS: As a parent of a student at Tempe Elementary School District No. 3, you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the classroom teachers who instruct your child. Federal law allows you to ask for certain information about your child's classroom teachers. It is our goal to give you this information in a timely manner if you ask for it. Specifically, you have the right to ask for the following information about each of your child's classroom teachers:

- Whether the Arizona State Board of Education -Certification Unit has licensed or qualified the teacher for the grades and subjects he or she teaches.
- Whether the Arizona State Board of Education has decided that the teacher can teach in a classroom without being licensed or qualified under state regulations because of special circumstances.
- The teacher's college major; whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and, if so, the subject of the degrees.
- Whether any teacher's assistant or similar paraprofessionals provide services to your child and, if they do, their qualifications.

If you would like to receive any of this information, please contact the principal of your child's school who will assist you in getting the requested information.
